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Welcome to Prairie Lakes Area Education Agency

Prairie Lakes Area Education Agency (PLAEA) serves educators, families, and our community partners as we work toward one ultimate goal - to improve student learning. Prairie Lakes AEA provides support in the areas of special education, educational services, media, and technology.

What is an AEA?

Prairie Lakes AEA is one of nine Area Education Agencies in Iowa. Iowa's Area Education Agencies (AEAs) were created in 1974 by the Iowa legislature to ensure that all Iowa children have equal opportunity for an exceptional education. AEAs remain responsible in ensuring that all children with disabilities receive the assistance they need to be successful. Support to local schools is provided through three service areas: Educational Services, Media Services, and Special Education Services. Area Education Agencies are funded from federal and state aid payments; legislatively controlled property tax; federal, state and private grants; and tuition from classes.

At Prairie Lakes AEA, a seven-member board of directors is elected by local school boards to govern budget decisions. The chief administrator handles the daily operations of the agency's service areas in partnership with agency and regional administrators.



Regional Administrator (RA)

Your primary source for information about Prairie Lakes services is your district's Regional Administrator. Regional Administrators provide leadership and supervision to staff members assigned to a specific geographic region. In addition, they provide guidance and best practice to meet the needs of districts, families, and students. Your district's assigned Regional Administrator is the front line of communication between the agency and your district.

School Improvement Facilitator (SIF)

The School Improvement Facilitator (SIF) provides a range of services to assigned school districts focused on a cycle of continuous improvement. A SIF will assist with identifying and implementing best practices, help school teams use qualitative and quantitative data to identify areas of strength and challenges, and use of continuous improvement tools to improve short and long-term outcomes.

Special Education Team Representatives

Team representatives have expertise in assisting schools with behavioral and academic interventions, the development and implementation of Individualized Education Programs (IEPs), as well as consultation and assessment for students who have school related learning, emotional, social, and behavioral concerns. Each school has assigned dyad partners with one having a focus on academics, and the other on behavior.

<u>Academics</u>

Special Education Consultants and/or Academic Strategists are essential team members in the Child Find process and play an important role during evaluations in determining eligibility for special education services. They collaborate with team members to complete evaluations such as diagnostic academic assessments. In addition, they analyze data to assist teams in the development of Individualized Education Plans (IEP) and appropriate goals.

<u>Behavior</u>

School Psychologists and/or School Social Workers are essential team members in the Child Find process and play an important role during evaluations in determining eligibility for special education services. They collaborate with team members to complete evaluations such as functional behavior assessments. In addition, they analyze data to assist teams in the development of intervention plans and individualized education plans with fidelity to improve social skills and appropriate behaviors.

Alternate Assessment

All students are expected to participate in district-wide assessments. Students with disabilities may participate without accommodations, with accommodations or through the state of Iowa Alternate Assessment. The Individualized Education Program (IEP) team considers the characteristics of the student and the nature and purpose of the assessment to determine the participation option that is most appropriate.

Assistive Technology (AT)

Prairie Lakes AEA provides assistance to school personnel regarding assistive technology consultation, short-term AT equipment loan, and sources of funding for AT devices considered. Audiology

Prairie Lakes AEA audiologists provide evaluation and identification of hearing levels for learners birth to 21 years of age. Audiologists gather hearing information and data about a child's/learner's access to verbal instruction. They help determine accommodations, modifications, and hearing assistive technology that may be needed in order to make the home or school accessible and coach the adults working with the students on how to implement these supports. Hearing booths are located in Algona, Fort Dodge, Spencer, and Storm Lake.

Challenging Behavior

Prairie Lakes AEA assists and supports local school-based teams in providing services to students whose behaviors significantly impact their own learning and the learning of other students when lower level interventions have not been effective. District staff should first work through their AEA building team and then if necessary send all referral information to the CBT members in their region. The referral form is available through your building/district's assigned behavior strategist. Your Regional Administrator can help guide you to the right resources for your district or school needs.





Child Find

Child Find refers to the area education agencies' (AEAs) responsibility to ensure that students who are eligible for special education services are identified, evaluated, and provided with needed services. Prairie Lakes AEA staff members follow statewide procedures for Child Find. These procedures can be found on the Iowa IDEA Information (i3)website.

Assessment and Data Evaluation Services

Agency staff provide consultation on the analysis, construction, development, use, strengths, weaknesses and interpretation of multiple forms of assessment data. PLAEA staff are available to help districts set up leadership teams and learning teams for the purpose of promoting assessment literacy. Teams study strategies for developing a comprehensive, balanced and aligned assessment system. The four major areas include: formative assessment/instructional process, common classroom assessments, interim assessments and summative assessments. Teams studying assessment literacy will develop the tools they need to face current district, school and classroom assessment challenges. Your School Improvement Facilitator can help connect you to the resources to meet your district/ school needs.







Iowa Principal Leadership Academy

The Iowa Principal Leadership Academy (IPLA) provides a comprehensive framework for PK-12 principal certification in the state of Iowa. Requirement to enter the program is a master's degree and a minimum of four years of successful teaching experience. The program is based on six problem-centered learning themes, predominantly field-based, related to the Iowa Standards for School Leaders. Each theme includes seminars, action research studies, action plans, portfolios, log of activities, toolbox activities, study of theory and research, and mentoring. Students engage in cohort groups over a two-year period, meeting in person 1 time per month. New cohorts begin in the spring of each odd year. (i.e. 2023, 2025, etc.)

Faculty of the program are selected primarily from practitioners with expertise in the selected areas. Participants show evidence to meet the standards and criteria of the Iowa Standards for School Leaders and acquire necessary skills to become instructional leaders. Prairie Lakes AEA and Keystone AEA partner to deliver IPLA.

LETRS is an intensive Professional Development course aligned to the Science of Reading that provides opportunities of learning for K-5 teachers of Literacy developed by Louisa Moats and Carol Tolman. Participants purchase online modules and PLAEA provides the End of the Unit training (40 hours over a 2-year period). LETRS instructs teachers in what literacy skills need to be taught, why, and how to plan to teach them.

LETRS is not a curriculum or a set of activities. The goal of the training is to "give people a knowledge base for doing the job," according to Moats.




Multicultural, Gender Fair Practices

Occupational Therapy (OT)

Occupational Therapy is a support service specializing in evaluation and treatment for students from birth to 21 years of age in educational and/or home settings. Therapists provide early intervention services for birth to 3 years of age by supporting child development with use of a coaching model during family routines. School based services support student access and participation through the least restrictive service delivery. Therapists assist school personnel, team members, and parents in adapting materials, methods, and the environment and in determination and use of appropriate assistive technology and/or equipment.

Paraeducator Certification

Prairie Lakes AEA is an approved provider of the Paraeducator Generalist Certification. Physical Therapy (PT)

Physical therapists work with children in their homes from birth to 3 years of age who have mobility concerns, positioning needs, or delays in gross motor achievement. The therapist works directly with the family and caregivers, along with the child, to integrate activities into the child's and family's established daily routines so skill practice is easily integrated into their day. After age 3, services are provided in a school setting where the therapist continues to address mobility, positioning, access, and participation in the school environment. Service delivery options range from consultation and training with the student's educational team to direct service provision with the student. In addition, physical therapists work with students and schools to obtain the necessary mobility and positioning equipment to allow for maximized independence and learning.

Positive Behavioral Interventions and Supports (PBIS)

Positive Behavioral Interventions and Supports (PBIS) is an evidence-based, tiered framework for supporting students' behavioral, academic, social, emotional, and mental health. When implemented with fidelity, PBIS improves social emotional competence, academic success, and school climate. It also improves teacher health and wellbeing. It is a way to create positive, predictable, equitable and safe learning environments where everyone thrives.

Speech-Language Pathology

Speech-Language Pathologists (SLP's) work with children in need on a variety of communication skills in the educational setting. These targeted skills are generally related to articulation, language, voice, fluency and early literacy. Students who have complex communication needs associated with significant disabilities are also served by the SLP. SLP's are able to offer several options for service delivery so that the student's individual needs are addressed, including consultation with students/teachers, collaboration with teachers and direct intervention with students. SLP's work closely with teachers to support and enrich communication skill development in the classroom and provide support in all communication-related areas for the local school district, as needed.

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Talented and Gifted

Each school district must include gifted and talented programming in its comprehensive school improvement plan as required by Iowa Code sections 257.42 and 257.43 pursuant to section 256.7 subsection 21, paragraph "a." Iowa Code 257.44 defines gifted and talented students as "those identified as possessing outstanding abilities who are capable of high performance. Gifted and talented children are children who require appropriate instruction and educational services commensurate with their abilities and needs beyond those provided by the regular school program." Prairie Lakes AEA provides services specifically tied to improving gifted education (TAG, G/T) programming.

Teacher Leadership and Coaching

The PLAEA Coaching Coordinator supports TLC leadership teams by leveraging teacher leaders in support of school improvement, evaluating the TLC program and teacher leader roles, and refining the TLC program and teacher leader roles for increased effectiveness and impact. Priority leadership support includes instructional coaching programs, mentoring and induction, and instructional frameworks. Teachers of the Deaf and Hard of Hearing (TDHH)

Prairie Lakes AEA's TDHH provide direct instruction and support for students who are deaf or hard of hearing between the ages of birth to 21 years old in their chosen mode of communication. They assist in determining appropriate modifications and accommodations in order to make the home or school accessible to the student. TDHH also provide insights into assessments and interventions based on their knowledge of how hearing loss impacts development and learning. TDHH assess the full range of communication and language levels, in addition to assessing the needs within the Expanded Core Curriculum for Deaf and Hard of Hearing.

Transportation Route Approval

School districts in Iowa are required by Iowa Code 285.9 to have each AEA Board of Directors review and approve all transportation agreements between districts and to approve all bus routes outside the boundary of the school operating buses. Districts are able to enter their agreements, permissions, and routes through the AEA Inter-District Transportation website. The following tutorials will walk you through each step of the process:

1.Review Allowable Conditions with Neighboring Districts (March)

2.Enter Your Permissions (April-May)

3. Certify Your Agreements (May-June)

4.Enter Your Routes (August-September)
